## Methodology and Sample Information

Between October 13 and October 31, 2022, Logit US completed 801 telephone interviews among a random sample of adult Arkansans. Forty percent of all respondents interviewed use cell phones for all or most of their calls.

The survey’s margin of error is +/- 3.5 percentage points, meaning we are 95 percent confident that the actual result lies within 3.5 percentage points (in either direction) of the result our sample produced. For the sub-sample of self-identified “very likely voters” only, the margin of error is +/- 4.1 percentage points.

Employing guidelines established by the American Association for Public Opinion Research, the poll’s overall cooperation rate was 15% for landline frame and 27% for wireless frame. This figure reflects completed surveys as a percentage of all eligible individuals contacted.<sup>17</sup> The sample was provided by Marketing Systems Group and Dynata.

To assess the representativeness of the sample drawn for the poll, the Arkansas Poll team publishes what many polling organizations do not: a comparison of survey respondents’ key demographic characteristics to those of the state as a whole. This information is reported in the table below.
